
MICHIGAN TECH APPLIED PORTFOLIO MANAGEMENT PROGRAM SCHOLARSHIPS

Recently we made a presentation on investment theory to the finance students in the Applied Portfolio Management Program (APMP) at Michigan Technological University (pictured at right).



The School of Business and Economics APMP students manage around one-half million dollars of the University's endowment. They invest in a diversified portfolio containing both stocks and bonds.

Over the life of the program the students have substantially outperformed their benchmarks utilizing a low risk 'enhanced indexing' strategy.

We awarded scholarships to the entire APMP student team based on their excellent research and analysis skills, and enthusiasm for the field of applied finance.

FINLANDIA UNIVERSITY

Michigan Tech is located in Houghton, Michigan, the birthplace of professional ice hockey and was home to the first U.S. professional team and champion – The Portage Lake Hockey Club.

The century old picture at right is the birthplace of professional hockey in North America – the Amphidrome built by James Dee in 1902 (now called Dee Stadium) – in Houghton on the shores of Lake Superior and Portage Lake.



The first U.S. professional team to win the World championship was the Portage Lake Hockey Club, Michigan, team of 1904 – defeating teams from Pittsburg and Montreal in this facility.
